

Conference season!

Conference season continued for AHPF Cymru members as we travelled to Swansea to attend the Plaid Cymru conference. A delegation of AHPF Cymru held a roundtable discussion with Sioned Williams MS, Plaid Cymru's spokesperson for Social Justice and Early Years. The theme of the discussion was early intervention and the important role of AHPs in supporting babies, children and young people. Much attention is paid in the media and in politics to the ageing population and the need to plan. However, the focus of this roundtable was that it's just as essential to think about our future generations and how to improve outcomes for babies, children and young people. We highlighted that Allied Health Professionals have a key role to play in improving children's social, physical and educational wellbeing. We stressed that AHPs work with children from birth into adulthood across sectors from neonatal units to schools, hospitals and youth offending teams. We also talked about our role at a population level supporting healthy habits which will affect children's future health such as healthy eating, physical activity and resilience. AHPF Cymru were represented by Dr Caroline Walters (RCSLT), Calum Higgins (CSP), Manel Tippet (BPS), Paul Smith (RCOT) and Tom Taylor (College of Paramedics).

AHPF were also invited to participate in the Marie Curie UK main stage debate on end-of-life care and were ably represented by our Chair, Dr Caroline Walters from the RCSLT. Joining Caroline on the panel were Natasha Davies from Marie Curie, Dr Rowena Christmas MBE from the RCGP and Plaid Cymru's Health spokesperson Mabon ap Gwynfor MS. The focus was on ensuring people receive the right care, at the right time and at the right place.

AHPF Cymru will be rounding off the conference season at the Reform UK Welsh conference, due to be held in Newport in the new year.



Evidence session

The Health and Social Care Committee has launched an inquiry into the future of general practice in Wales and are currently receiving oral evidence from stakeholders. Manifesto discussions

AHPF Cymru continued our manifesto discussions with meetings with Plaid Cymru's Mabon ap Gwynfor MS and Reform UK's Matt Mackinnon. To remind you, the five key areas of the manifesto are:

1. A National Workforce Strategy for AHPs.
2. Timely access to AHP services for those working in health and social care.
3. Expand access to the AHP professions through exploring routes, in consultation with the professions, such as degree apprenticeships.
4. Ensure that services within the community are delivered within suitable buildings.
5. Allow patients the right to access AHP services as part of their treatment pathway.
